

Sewer Separation Project

The Lawrence Street Combined Sewer Separation Project is a high-priority public infrastructure investment designed to eliminate stormwater inflow into our sewer system along Lawrence Street between Harrison and Monroe Streets.

This project directly supports the City's General Sewer Plan, improves capacity at the Monroe Street Lift Station, and restores ADA, walking, and biking infrastructure in Uptown Port Townsend. The current approach to this project balances cost, regulatory compliance, and community benefit. The proposed design builds on existing street amenities from Harrison and Tyler Streets.

City staff are now exploring funding options for this project. The total project cost estimate is \$5.8 million. The majority of the project will be funded through low-interest loans from the Public Works Board and Department of Ecology. To support competitive applications, the City will provide a 20% local match totaling approximately \$1.16 million.

This match will be distributed across the Water, Sewer, Stormwater funds, and Transportation Benefit District (TBD) funds, with TBD contribution expected to be less than \$400,000. If funding applications are successful, the project is expected to be completed in 2027-2028.

Summer 2025 Water Conservation Update

The City of Port Townsend relies on precipitation in the Olympic Mountains to meet our municipal and industrial water needs. Flow in the Big Quilcene River, our primary water source, is typically sustained by the snowpack through July. By early September it is often necessary to utilize water from Lords Lake, a 500-million-gallon storage reservoir, when low stream flows limit water withdrawals from the rivers. Dry conditions this year have accelerated depletion of the watershed snowpack. Drawdown of Lords Lake Reservoir this year began on August

Key Features

The proposed design builds on existing street amenities from Harrison and Tyler Streets and includes the following:

- Full separation of stormwater from the sanitary sewer.
- New ADA-compliant curb ramps and sidewalk connections.
- Bulb-outs at Taylor and Quincy Streets for pedestrian safety
- Stormwater treatment using rain gardens.
- Full rehabilitation and strengthening of the sublayers and new pavement
- Continuation of narrow lanes, bike lanes, and on-street parking.
